



#### Learning and Exploring at Play (LEAP)

The Center becomes the home of the University's early childhood reading and math literacy program, now known as LEAP, after it was established in 2004 in the career center.

# Transition Opportunities at the University of Rochester (TOUR)

The Center begins collaboration with Monroe One Educational Services for Transition Opportunities at the University of Rochester (TOUR), an inclusive post-secondary education initiative through which undergraduates serve as academic and social mentors for students with intellectual and developmental disabilities.

# Committee for Political Engagement (CPE)

The Center expands its efforts to foster non-partisan political engagement for students with the creation of the student Committee for Political Engagement, a student advisory board to lead voter registration and education and other efforts to ensure students are informed and active participants in democratic processes.

# National Study of Learning, Voting, and Engagement

The Center leads the University in becoming a founding participant in the National Study of Learning, Voting, and Engagement administered by Tufts University. The Study provides data on voting registration and participation by students for even-year elections in the United States.

# "King For A Day"

In collaboration with the Rochester Regional Network, an advisory group consisting of community engagement representatives from other area colleges, and in partnership with the local not-for-profit, Rochester Cares, and student organizations, the Center coordinates efforts to commemorate Dr. Martin Luther King national day of service through a service program called "King For A Day." The Center receives a subgrant from Campus Compact for the effort.

#### Lattimore Hall

In recognition of its growing size and importance, the Center relocates from the fifth floor of Wilson Commons to Lattimore Hall, gaining its own dedicated administrative support for the first time. The Center has 3.5 staff members, including the director, plus a dozen AmeriCorps VISTA members in service and several dozen student employees.

#### Community-Engaged Learning

The Center launches its community-engaged learning initiative, which builds a community of practice among faculty, staff and community partners for designing and delivering coursework in collaboration with non-academic community partners.

# Certificate in Community-Engaged Learning

The Center designs the certificate of achievement in communityengaged learning and begins offering seminars to support students in learning fundamental concepts and skills for effective community engagement, culminating in a capstone project jointly



## Medallion Leadership program

In close collaboration with Wilson Commons Student Activities and the Office of Fraternity and Sorority Affairs, the Center develops the Medallion Leadership program to enable students to develop leadership knowledge, skills, and abilities. The Center contributes civic engagement workshops to the program.

#### "Breaking the Bubble"

In collaboration with the Office of Residential Life and Housing Services, the Center launches the "Breaking the Bubble" community conversation series to address timely topics and innovative work being done in the local community by students, faculty, and community changemakers.

#### Carnegie Classification

The Center plays a leadership role in the University's first successful application for the elective classification in community engagement offered by the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching. The University becomes one of only a handful of Research 1 universities to achieve the classification, which recognizes the University's alignment with best practices in the field.

#### **Voter Education**

With support from the University's Office of Equity and Inclusion, the Center launches a partnership with Democracy Works to develop a portal to support voter education and participation by students and other members of the University community.

# Center for Community Engagement

The Center rebrands as the Center for Community Engagement in recognition of the growth of this area of its work and its strategic importance to the University and the local community.

#### **Student Organization Advocacy**

Working in collaboration with Wilson Commons Student Activities, the Center serves as advocate for more than 20 student organizations whose missions focus on community engagement or politics, helping to connect them to community partnerships and existing campus programming and resources.

## **Faculty Fellows Initiative**

The Center creates the faculty fellows initiative provide engaged faculty with part-time appointments to serve as ambassadors for community-engaged learning with other faculty and departments. Rachel O'Donnell and Rose Pasquarello-eauchamp become the inaugural faculty fellows, later to be joined by Jonathan Holz.

#### **New Partnerships For Literacy**

Adapting to changing community needs, the Center forges new partnerships for its early childhood literacy programming, collaborating with Allendale Columbia Summer Leap and the Roc Reading Partners program at the University's Warner School.



# Celebrating 20 Years

With 8.5 employees, 8 AmeriCorps VISTA members, and more than 60 student employees, the Center shifts reporting lines to the new senior vice provost for academic excellence, giving it a University-wide purview and the prospect for supporting both undergraduate and graduate students across the Universities seven academic colleges. The Center also works in close coordination with the University's vice president for community partnerships, Dr. Shaun Nelms.
