Presenting Greentopia Festival: Film, Music and Fun in the Rochester Area



Bringing a dynamic, sustainability-infused edge to the Rochester area this week, the Greentopia festival is a weeklong event aimed at enticing denizens to observe and experience acts of artistic expression within the realms of sustainability. From September 10 through September 16, the festival will offer visitors a series of events, including film showings, musical performances, art exhibits, an Innovation Conference and EcoFest.

Last year's 2-day inaugural event drew over 18,000 attendees, 140 vendors, an alternative energy vehicle show, and more. This year's festival cuts an even wider swath; it has evolved not only in length of time, but also in the variety of offerings for the Rochester community.

The most promoted, lengthiest component is Greentopia Film, which will kick off the festival on Monday and is comprised of documentary films that ultimately aim to inspire the audience to create sustainable change in their communities. One film that may have particular appeal to students is "Bidder 70," which examines the case of environmental activist Tim DeChristopher, who gained notoriety for derailing an oil and gas lease auction in 2008. The festival will also offer "Terra Blight," a feature-length documentary exploring American technology consumerism, including the life cycle of computers from creation to disposal.

Following this component is the EcoFest, comprised of a fashion show, car show, food, music, and art exhibitions – and attendance is free! The Innovation Conference will be held on September 14 at the Rochester Plaza Hotel, and is a 1-day conference presenting a wide range of speakers covering business strategies and innovation topics. Speakers include Cornell Provost Kent Fuchs, as well as President and CEO of Sweetwater Energy Jack Baron.

According to the website, Greentopia is a festival of "ideas that empower everybody to create a positive change on the planet we call home." Tickets and passes are available online, and further information including locations can be found at www.greentopiafestival.com and below:

Second Annual Shred **Fest Results Surpass Previous Record**

Last July, the University held its Second Annual Shred Fest. an event devoted to securely recycling confidential documents of University employees. Partnering with Iron Mountain, a company devoted to recycling confidential documents and one that the University has worked with in the past, the University offered a service to protect individual privacy in an environmentally friendly manner. The documents were first placed into a locked 65gallon container and then sent up a chute in the truck to be securely shredded. A camera placed inside the truck provided participants the opportunity to witness their documents being shredded. The collection achieved a total estimated weight of 15,750 pounds – over 7 tons. This is a substantial improvement from last year's 12,390 pounds.

Cooling Packs From Strong Memorial Hospital Find New Application

An assistant at Strong Memorial Hospital of URMC found a new way to save cooling packs. Vast quantities of materials are transported to the hospital, many of which are temperature-sensitive and are surrounded by reusable ice packs. These packs are normally discarded. Axel Kairies and his co-workers

discovered Meals on Wheels Association of America, a national organization that accepts cooling packs

to preserve perishable food during transportation.

Since October 2010, Kairies and other volunteers delivered cooling packs to this

organization. After the first three months of the project, a total of 450 packs were donated. In 2011, over 1,750 pounds of cooling packs were saved So far this

year, over 1,000 pounds of packs were reused.
