# **Event Check-In**

This semester Wilson Commons Student Activities will be using a new Event Check-In feature for events, programs, and activities! Event Check-in will be taking the place of swiping your Student ID at events.

What do you need? Instead of your student ID, you will use your Campus Community Connection (CCC) Event Pass. Your Event Pass is specific to YOU and will never change.

To get your Event Pass:

- 1. Sign in to ccc.rochester.edu
- 2. Click on your account icon
- 3. Select event pass in the menu
- 4. Save your Event Pass:
  - a. To Google Wallet
  - b. To Apple Pay
  - c. To your mobile device with a screenshot or desktop photo
  - d. Print it out and carry it with you

How does it work? Show your Event Pass (either from your mobile device or printed out) to event staff anywhere you see the Event Check-In is HERE signs.

Why Event Check-In? Faster and more accurate than card readers! Wilson Commons Student Activities uses counts of attendees and other information from events to improve our programs, advocate for more variety of events, offer specialized events, and ensure that our diverse population is well served outside of the classroom.

#### **Student Organization Supply Closet**

SA Funded Student Organizations or those hosting SA funded programs and events can now request general craft supplies, party supplies, and paper products from the NEW Student Organization Supply Closet.

Eligible Organizations can request items from a list of available products by meeting with their Primary Advisor. Primary Advisors will fill out and sign a form granting permission to take the items.
