Child poverty is a serious problem in Rochester, with approximately 50 percent of children living below the poverty line. Current research points to poverty itself as the cause of negative outcomes for poor children—not associated problems such as poor nutrition, low levels of parental education, poor schools, or crime-ridden neighborhoods. Systemic racism in the form of wage, education, and housing inequities contributes directly to poverty, and a direct assault on systemic racism needs to redress poverty as well as the causes of poverty. Poverty causes debilitating outcomes in cognition, emotional stability, and health for poor children. Directly addressing poverty through interventions such as an unconditional cash allowance or direct money transfers for poor households can promote positive changes in parenting, home environment, and maternal depression as well as children's cognitive

TRANSFORM RESEARCH CENTER Every year, millions of children in the United States suffer child abuse and neglect (USDHHS, 2017). Our CAPSTONE Center for Multidisciplinary Research in Child Abuse and Neglect (P50) Project is a national resource center for conducting innovative research; disseminating emerging discoveries; and training investigators, clinicians, and professionals committed to preventing and treating child maltreatment. The TRANSFORM Center (Translational Research that Adapts New Science FOR Maltreatment Prevention) builds on current state-of-the-art research methodologies and clinical practices to foster the next generation of professionals committed to addressing the personal and societal burden associated with child abuse and neglect. • builds engagement and networking skills There are three volunteer dates scheduled on Saturdays each semester that range from two- to four-hour time commitments. Any students interested in social justice, community building, and social service careers are highly encouraged to join this low-commitment and fulfilling program. The program began in spring semester 2018, and students have currently volunteered with 12 local nonprofits. To date, we have had 117 students volunteer over five semesters with an average of 9.75 volunteers participating on each date. Unfortunately, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, we were unable to schedule any dates for students to volunteer during the 2020–21 academic year.

In 2018, Catherine Cerulli, director of the Susan B. Anthony Center, taught as a Fulbright scholar at Jamia Millia Islamia (JMI) university in New Delhi, sparking an international collaboration that has culminated in a new international journal, the South Asian Journal of Law, Policy, and Social Research. The founding editors, Saiyed Naseer Husain Jafri and Syed Umair Ahmed Andrabi, were law students at JMI who saw the need for an open-source journal dedicated to combining legal analysis with evidence-based social research to address fundamental human rights to food, housing, clothing, and safety in the South Asia region. The theme of gender-based violence (GBV) in South Asia was chosen for the first issue. According to a recent report by the United Nations, worldwide, the region with the largest number of all women killed by intimate partners or family members in 2017 was Asia with 20,000 deaths (United Nations Office on Drugs and Crime, 2018). We are pleased to announce that in fall 2020, the first issue of the journal was printed, and the online version was in the top ten downloads globally in its categories for weeks running.

Jane R. Plitt serves as a visiting scholar at the University of Rochester through the Susan B. Anthony Center. Plitt, a Cornell labor relations graduate, has spent her life advocating for equal rights. In addition to her professional achievements in Rochester, she played a pivotal role in eliminating segregated men's-only grills and gender-segregated help-wanted ads as well as integrating the Rochester Jaycees and other service organizations, which led to the acceptance of women as full members of the Rotary, Kiwanis, and Lions clubs. In 1973, she became the first national executive director of the National Organization for Women (NOW), a civil rights group advocating for women's rights. She cofounded the Rochester Women's Network and refamiliarized, through her biographies,

the pioneering achievements of the forgotten Martha Matilda Harper, who created modern retail franchising and put poor women into those franchises around the world, launching social

Since 2000, she has published two children's books educating youth about Harper, Martha's Magical Hair and Martha the Hairpreneur. **HELEN WILEY** Helen Wiley is researching the life of Hester C. Jeffrey, an African American woman who moved to Rochester in 1891 and who was active both locally and nationally in women's clubs, suffrage associations, African American political associations, charity work, and church activities. Over the last two years as a visiting scholar, Wiley has focused her research on Jeffrey's associations and work in Rochester from 1891 to 1916. The Rare Book and Manuscript Collections of the University of Rochester contain a treasure trove of primary materials from this period that help document Jeffrey's activities in a variety of local organizations. The materials in these collections draw a picture of an African American woman who worked side by side with Susan B. and Mary Anthony and other (mostly white) women of Rochester to support women's suffrage in the Political Equality Club and the New York State Woman Suffrage Association. In addition, Jeffrey helped bring leading African American orators of the day, such as Ida B. Wells-Barnett, Mary Church Terrell, Charles Douglass, Coralie Franklin Cook, and Victoria Earle Matthews, to speak at public gatherings in Rochester; organized and led local clubs of African American women and girls; and participated actively in the congregations of both First Unitarian Church and AME Zion Church.
